Crissy Field Center encourages new generations to become bold leaders for thriving parks, healthy communities, and a more environmentally just society. This multicultural urban environmental center is a partnership of the Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy, the National Park Service, and the Presidio Trust. Since opening its doors in 2001, the Center has served more than 750,000 people with school field trips, summer camps, outreach and afterschool programs, youth internships, family events, and more. The Center's programs are supported by the over 14,000 members of the Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy as well as grants from private foundations and public agencies. The Parks Conservancy is the non-profit membership organization created to preserve the Golden Gate



Bay Area Wilderness Training creates opportunities for urban youth to experience wilderness first-hand and exists as a comprehensive source of support to agencies that lead youth wilderness trips. Who is eligible?

To participate in CAP, community organizations or schools must meet the criteria listed below. If your organization has multiple programs, each program must be evaluated for eligibility.

Community organizations must:

- Offer their services for free or at low cost
- Work with children and youth who are part of families with limited income

In addition, youth served by the community organization must meet one of the following criteria:

- Receive free or reduced-cost lunch
- Have emotional, physical, or developmental needs
- Experience barriers that have prevented them from visiting a national park

How does the program work? *If eligible, the following steps need to be taken.*

STEP 1

The CAP Leadership Training is designed to provide leaders with the skills and resources to plan and lead a youth camping trip here in the Presidio and beyond. During the two-day and one-night CAP Leadership Training, teachers and leaders practice front-country camping skills and familiarize themselves with the Presidio's natural, historical, and cultural resources. Participants learn the basics on how to reserve future camping trips through CAP and are trained to lead place-based nature hikes and other outdoor activities. After program leaders and teachers have completed the Leadership Training, they are certified and can then begin scheduling camping trips to the Presidio.

Training Cost

- \$45 per person

The most useful part of the training was learning the intentionality behind every process of camping and how that translates to leading groups.

STEP 2

Certified leaders can reserve their camping date for the season, which begins in March and goes through October. There are two campsites at Rob Hill; each accommodates up to 30 people and includes picnic tables, barbecue grills, a central campfire ring, running water, and restrooms.

The camping package includes:

- Overnight stay at Rob Hill Campground in the Presidio
- Use of camping equipment including tents, sleeping bags, pads, and cooking equipment
- Participation in a 2 hour guided park program (optional)
- Discounted roundtrip transportation to and from your school or community center (if necessary)

Program Cost

- \$75 per visit for group size up to 30 people, \$25 per additional night on same visit
- \$100 for roundtrip transportation*

**Teachers arranging their own district transportation may qualify for camping fee reductions*

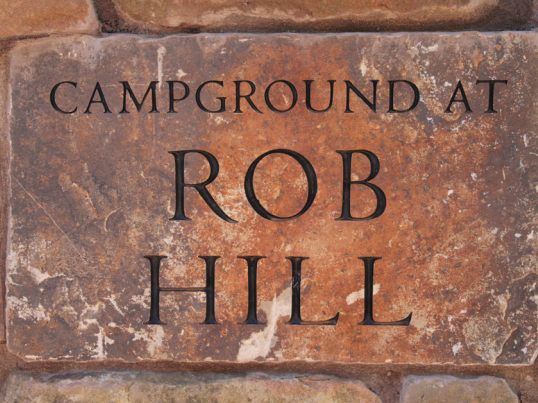

Camping in San Francisco?

Yes! Stretching 40 miles north and south of the Golden Gate, the Golden Gate National Recreation Area preserves 80,600 acres of open space and provide unlimited opportunities for recreation, learning, and enjoyment. The Campground at Rob

Hill—nestled in a eucalyptus grove in the Presidio—is one of the hidden gems of this park. The only camping facility in San Francisco, Rob Hill is a fantastic venue for outdoor learning and fun, bringing the experience of a national park to the city's doorstep.

Our mission

To provide meaningful gateway camping experiences to children and youth who traditionally have not visited national parks, the Crissy Field Center (operated by the Golden Gate National Parks Conservancy and National Park Service), Presidio Trust, and Bay Area Wilderness Training have developed the Camping at the Presidio (CAP) program. Designed for community organizations and schools, CAP is being offered through the Crissy Field Center and provides a dynamic and affordable way to enrich the lives of young people. The Presidio Trust, working directly with Crissy Field Center, is taking the lead in making this campground available to all our communities.
