A TRACK RECORD OF INNOVATION IN EDUCATION

Urban families need access to nature and safe, healthy outdoor experiences. Every child in San Francisco deserves nothing less, and the Presidio is uniquely positioned to secure that vital right.

For over 15 years, the Golden Gate National Parks
Conservancy, Presidio Trust, and National Park Service
have been offering park programs that support academic
achievement, environmental literacy, and leadership and
career development.



Crissy Field Center, a hub of that collaborative effort, provides more than 300,000 hours of award-winning programming to young people every year. The Center serves youth (and the mentors and organizations that support them) by providing a cutting-edge facility for enriching school-based education—while also offering a safe and vibrant space for developing leadership skills, exploring careers in and beyond the parks, examining themes of environmental and social justice, and fostering a sense of self and community.

Over time, demand and enthusiasm from schools and community groups have grown to exceed the capacity of existing facilities.



AN OPPORTUNITY TO SERVE MORE YOUTH

Through the Presidio Tunnel Tops project, the Crissy Field Center youth campus will be expanded, dramatically increasing the number of youth currently served—from roughly 30,000 across our Presidio and NPS programs to more than 100,000. That's **nearly every child in San Francisco**. The Tunnel Tops project will expand Crissy Field Center facilities, build a new Field Station, and create a three-acre Playscape.



CRISSY FIELD CENTER

Rehabilitated and renovated with accessible classrooms, a new lab building, and outdoor kitchen/gathering area



FIELD STATION

New visitor destination equipping and encouraging outdoor explorers of all ages to discover the Presidio and other national parks



PLAYSCAPE

Free space for exercise and unstructured play, designed to correspond with the Cities Connecting Children to Nature initiative and the San Francisco Children's Outdoor Bill of Rights

A LEGACY OF COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIP

The staff at the Crissy Field Center—comprising a passionate mix of educators, activists, and youth workers—represent 10 different ethnicities and speak a total of five languages. Their tireless work elevates and amplifies the impact of park programming to every neighborhood of San Francisco and beyond.

Since its opening in 2001, Crissy Field Center has partnered with more than 135 community-based organizations, 85 public schools, and 9 colleges and universities. Leveraging those partnerships, the Tunnel Tops will serve, inspire, and delight kids and their families from all of our diverse communities.
