JENNIE RHINE AND TOM MEYER

undreds of San Francisco public school fourth and fifth graders have participated in four amazing autumns of raptor education, thanks to the contributions of Tom Meyer in memory of his wife and Golden Gate Raptor Observatory bander Jennie Rhine. Wishing to honor Jennie's lifelong devotion to raptors and commitment to community science, Tom inspired us to join our work serving underrepresented young people with our research on behalf of raptors, creating a program that would cultivate the volunteers, scientists, even rangers of tomorrow and foster their lifelong relationships with our national parks.

Both in the classroom and on Hawk Hill, Crissy Field Center educators lead a deep curriculum in raptor migration, which the young students relate to their own journeys, whether moving houses, schools or countries. Beyond just learning about raptorscience, the students develop and maintain understanding, curiosity, and appreciation for the natural world as well as positive and empathetic connections with staff, teachers, and classmates.

Tom continues to underwrite this program annually, and recently he made an enormous investment – a nest egg! – in the future of young ornithologists by establishing a legacy commitment to endow this program for generations to come. Jennie's legacy – and now Tom's – will ensure that we will continue to inspire future conservationists and scientists.
